Saturday 13th September 2014


Crescent Garden Green Team will lead two guided tours at 11am and 2pm.


The afternoon concluded with an excellent tea. Thank you to all who helped and provided food to make this day a success.

GARDEN REPORT

long and cold spring in 2013 was followed by a hot and dry summer leading into a grim autumn and winter with its deluge of rain and gale force winds. Before the worst of the weather arrived we managed to plant various heritage tulips, narcissi and then, in early spring, some English bluebells in the green.

However the garden did experience some gale damage including a Euonymus at the East Gate which split and lost two large limbs. The Spanish chestnut lost a large limb around Christmas Eve and the council subsequently cut the whole tree down as it was deemed unsafe. A small tree on Terrace Walk came down and smashed through a neighbour's fence in Fort Road, and two others in the same location were removed by the council. A Rhamnus alaternus Variegata, a lovely variegated shrub, was another victim of the winds. We do want to replace



it but will change the location to the East Gate and plant two new shrubs to help screen the brash from the path.

The recent temperatures have been high resulting in the early arrival of spring and there have been some lovely plants for us all to enjoy including the Lonicera fragrantissima at East Gate and Mimosa along Terrace Walk. We have appreciated the early arrival of Snowdrops, Crocuses, Narcissi and Tulips.

We have planted a variety of half-hardy and hardy seeds. Annie Sayle is also a volunteer at Haslar Memorial Garden and has kindly made use of the spare capacity in their poly-tunnel and greenhouse to bring the seedlings on. Annie and I are very excited by the connection between these two historic gardens and hope the Green Flag judges will approve.

We do hope all Friends of the Garden are able to take the time to walk through the garden regularly and enjoy its special atmosphere.

The volunteer gardeners are a dedicated band and work hard to maintain the high standards set since the formation of the garden. In the next three months, in partnership with Gosport Council, we will be working hard to ensure that we are once again awarded a Green Flag.

If anyone would like to join the Green Team we are there every Wednesday morning so do come and join us. It's very rewarding, great fun and helps you keep fit!

The new tulips planted in the autumn are really coming along! If you feel an urge to come and join us on Wednesday mornings please don't hesitate to come into the garden and talk to us!



GARDEN CUTTINGS

embers will, no doubt, be aware of the ancient Tulip Tree (Liriodendron tulipifera) which dominates the western end of the garden and has stood there proudly for the better part of 200 years. Although sadly now in decline, this wonderful specimen will be remembered fondly for its large yellow and orange tulip-shaped flowers which bloom in May and early June and its almost equally vibrant autumn colours.

A member of the Magnolia family, the Tulip Tree is a native of America and the tallest of all its hardwoods, growing to 100 feet or more and used in making furniture, cabinetry, musical instruments and wood veneer. Over the years the tree has acquired several names including Tulip Poplar, Yellow Poplar and Canoe Wood. The latter name harks back to when Native Americans built canoes from the lightweight timber logs of this tree. The natural range of this hardy, long-lived tree is throughout the east-coast from southern New England to the northern half of Florida.

The celebrated plant collector John Tradescant the Younger (1608-1662), made three voyages to Virginia in 1637, 1642 and



1654. These journeys, at such an early stage in the setting up of the colony, were to produce a treasure trove of plants and trees and it was in the family garden at Lambeth in London that the discoveries from Virginia, including the Tulip Tree, were raised.

It was at Mount Vernon that the Tulip Tree had its proudest historical moment. George Washington introduced it there in 1785. It would grow so majestically that it would be selected as Mount Vernon's official bicentennial tree.

On this side of the Atlantic, in a quiet corner of Alverstoke, a distant relative lives on, no less admired by all who see her. When next you gaze upon her, reflect on her great longevity and the many changes she has seen.
